




In 1994, Mary Lou dreamed up a garden tour by and for real people, a tour "for the rest of us", so a yearly event was born that brought out thousands of guests who gave generously to Mary Lou's charity, the Sheepfold. After her passing, we asked ourselves, when the Mary Lous of the world are lost, how will charity organizations like these go on? The tour is continued today in Mary Lou's name because she was so devoted to giving back for the help she received during a very rough time and saw the benefits of helping others like

## Mary Lou wrote the following for her last newsletter, published Spring 2002.

It seems like just yesterday. It's hard to believe it's been nearly 20 years. I remember thinking that I would be happy if I can have even one year to garden. I don't know if I ever had a newsletter that was harder to write, even though I've always wanted to tell you how much I've felt blessed being allowed to do what I love and share it with others. This newsletter is still difficult, so bear with me please. . .

It was in the late 70's and I had been through a divorce that literally pushed me over the edge. My world came to an abrupt halt, and no matter how hard I tried to regain my footing, I just slipped further and further away. When it became clear that I could not even handle any of the simple tasks of caring for my 10 year old daughter, I was hospitalized. I'm certain there was no other choice, but it also meant that it would be like building a life all over again, one painful step at a time.

I discovered gardening when I was in the hospital. It was just the smallest patch of earth, but there was such peace there. It was in great disrepair, and sometimes I would just stand there and survey all that needed to be done. It wasn't too long before I was on my hands and knees pulling weeds and lost in chores. Time passed so quickly when I was in the garden, and for the first time in many weeks, there were no tears. It became my special place. I would throw on my clothes at the first light of morning and stay there all day. My heart was at peace, and though I didn't know it at the time, the long road to healing had begun.

Discharge day came, and it was time to face the world again, but I would never forget what happened in the garden. I came to know God there. . . I was not alone. No matter how difficult what lay ahead, I was not alone. Does God actually care enough to give us the desires of our heart? Well, you tell me.

It might have only been a "passing prayer" that you say as an after thought, but as the world pushed harder for me to take my place. . . I asked, "Please Lord, just let me garden for my life's work" - as path led unto path, that prayer would come to mind. I didn't care how - I just wanted to spend my life there in the garden.

I began selling herbs and flowers at the swap meet on the weekends, and attended horticulture classes and gathering and planting my plants during the week. I couldn't see where it was going, but the swap meet had become a sort of "mini" business. The plants and flowers that I would take were now everywhere, covering every bush and patch of lawn that belonged to our four unit apartment. I wasn't too surprised when the landlord said it had to go. Problem was I had nowhere to go and no money to offer if I did locate a place. I thought I had gone up and down every street in Orange County when I turned down an out-of-the-way street

just to see where it led. I happened upon a piece of property with an out-building on it. I sat there for the longest time just looking at it. Although the building and grounds had fallen into disrepair, it looked like a doll house to me. I could feel my heart jump. It took all the courage I could muster to knock on the door and ask for a chance to rent a portion of their property.

The young man explained the property was owned by his Grandfather and handled by his Uncle. It would be a week before they could get me an answer. I could hardly breathe. At least he didn't say, "No." Now all I had to do was wait. . . and pray.

Well, the day arrived. I had all I could do to wait for a decent hour. After all, I don't think it would have set very well with them if I had knocked on the door at 5:30 AM, but I could have because I didn't sleep a wink that night. The young man answered the door and invited me in. "Did you decide?" Not wanting to appear too anxious. "Yes, my Uncle thinks it would be good." "Really?" I answered.

This was probably not one of my notable conversations because I was totally speechless and floating 10 feet off the ground. I wondered if he noticed? With a few other details and a handshake - I was on my way. Now if you were to ask me if I had a plan - I did not. I only knew that I felt I was being given a gift from God and I was going to be allowed to garden. - for how long. . . I don't know. It didn't matter to me. This dear family did not know me from Adam and had put total faith and trust in me and given me the opportunity of a lifetime. . . an everyday occurrence? I don't think so. Not in this world.

I threw myself into the clean up effort (I was never short of elbow grease), put a coat of paint and some curtains on the building, and it became my cottage. I couldn't wait to get there in the morning, and I hated to leave at night. I was gardening, and my heart was at peace. My love for the garden was insatiable, and all the years I spent reading garden and seed catalogues were beginning to find a home. What I couldn't get at the wholesale growers I would grow myself, from seed. The joy was almost more than I could stand, so when the family that owned the property came to see if I would be interested in the entire front half of the property including the building - I jumped at it.

I knew I would have to make the additional space pay for itself, but somehow I would have to make it work. Friends tried to talk me out of it using all logic of a business person. The location was not right. I would never be able to recoup my investment. The family or the city could come at anytime and pull the rug out from under me. My answer was always the same. If I'm allowed to garden even one more year, I will be happy. As always it was a handshake agreement. They believed in me, and there was nothing I

would do to let them down. That was 1985.

There were obstacles. Many obstacles. Some that even threatened to shut us down. In the beginning I would literally shake as I would see the city car drive up and walk across the gravel carrying official forms. No, it was not always a smooth ride, but one by one I came to learn and trust someone greater was clearing the way for us.

There were always plenty of chores. Enough so that you could never say you were done. At the end of each day I would look around at trays full of plants all "cleaned up" like little children with freshly scrubbed faces and in clean pajamas ready for bed. I would be covered in dirt and exhausted - but it was a wonderful feeling. All my energy spent in tasks that I loved - I wouldn't realize how tired I was until I finally sat down for the first time. I ached - but felt good. I usually fell asleep before I had a chance to watch a single television program.

By anybody's standard the store was humble at best. Our goal was to offer old-fashioned flowers, plants and herbs. Plants that would help people discover the joy of gardening, flowers that I remembered from my childhood. We loved every minute of it, even though there were many times I literally held my breath to keep the doors open and pay the bills.

I was used to Saturdays as being as quiet as the other days, but on this particular Saturday I looked up to see people living up by the front gate!!! A sea of people. More people than I had ever seen at the store at one time. One lady was clutching an article in her hand. I asked her how she had heard about us? "Why because of the article in the paper. Here, you can keep it. I know where you are now." Unbeknownst to me a reporter from the Orange County Register had come in looking around and written about us. She even explained how to find us, and people came. Once again I knew we had been blessed.

As the days went on, people began coming to the store. They would bring their friends and the friends would bring friends. It seemed I was always running out of stock. Since I was too small to have any vendors deliver to me, it meant that I had to take my truck up to Santa Barbara to pick up stock. First it was once a week, then twice and then three times. The flood gates of heaven opened and poured out a blessing the likes of which I could not contain. . . and we grew.

Sometimes I would stand alone in the gardens after everyone had gone home and in the quiet - survey all that I saw and remembered the broken, wounded woman that asked to be allowed to garden for my life's work. And I would look around at all the beauty I saw. . . including the woman whose life He had put back together. . . and I would hear Him say "Behold my handy work!"

It was so much more than I ever imagined even possible. I loved to talk about flowers. Their very special attributes, such as their nodding heads or their diminutive nature. Oh, they were all so special to me, but finding other people that wanted to talk about flowers? I always assumed things like that would be too frivolous for anyone to take time out of their busy day to indulge in. Does God give us the desires of our heart? Make no mistake.

You have become more than customers to us - you have become friends. We laughed with you when you had joy to share and cried with you when you hurt. You made it possible - you are Heard's Gardens and you blessed us. I know I speak for all of us when I say "Thank you." Thank you for standing by us when conditions were less than ideal. Thank you for your loyalty and friendship. Thank you.

I always knew our crew was special - we were more like family than co-workers, but I never knew how special until June of 2000 when I was diagnosed with colon cancer. They were right by my side throughout the ordeal and without a word of complaint they took on the additional workload and kept the place running without ever missing a beat. To the public it looked like business as usual, but it was not. They have carried the store for two years. As my strength has slipped away from me, they became the "wind beneath my wings" quietly holding me up so that I could be the one to fly. There are no words that I can find that would adequately say thank you to them. We had all hoped that this thing would have run its course and allowed me to bounce back, but it has not. Though there are still many more gardens in my heart that have to be planted - the body is calling for rest. Saying good-bye is the hardest thing I have ever had to do.



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



When the Brown-Middlesworth's bought this house in 1994, it was filled with dying trees and dirt! They had visions of turning it into a "cottage garden" with lush green lawns. Ha! Mother Nature, bad soil, dogs, and the drought had other plans.

Today, the garden has emerged into an outdoor living space with multiple garden vignettes. Sit in the courtyard of artificial turf, filled with Australian Violet, Baby Tears, azaleas, camellias, and Pittosporums. Stroll down the side yard, "secret garden" filled with succulents growing in repurposed vessels. The Donkey Tail plant is from a 1974 cutting. Spend time on the patio with hanging annuals, or sit on the redwood deck and listen to the wind chimes in the ornamental pear growing through the deck. Venture up the stairs to the pergola to watch the sunset. The gardeners let the sod go, in favor of "playground" grass that grows with very little water. The 60-foot, terraced flower beds are filled with floribunda roses, Lantana, California natives, butterflies, and hummingbirds.

Colette and Tim were originally daunted by the large lot when they purchased their home in February 2009. They didn't believe in wasting water on the expansive, existing lawns, so they embarked on creating a water-wise garden.

The front yard includes a cactus and succulent garden with a Palo Verde tree, olive trees, ornamental grasses, and a variety of native or pollinator-attracting shrubs. They also added a vegetable garden that provides an abundant amount of produce year round. The backyard includes lemon, lime, mandarin, avocado, apricot, and mango trees. Both lawns are UC Verde Buffalo Grass; a low water, high heat-tolerant grass.

The gardeners increased their useable outdoor space by incorporating two Brazilian Walnut (Ipe) decks with a wonderful designed driveway that captures and returns the rain water to the ground water supply. Their favorite part of their creation is the butterflies, bees, praying mantis, ladybugs, and all the birds that enjoy sharing this space. The Bruce's were excited to be a runner up winner in Roger's Garden California Friendly Garden Contest in 2014 and are happy to be part of the Mary Lov Heard Memorial Garden Tour for the second time.

A 1970's, Mission Viejo, split-level lot with plenty of room for gardening! The focus in the front is on edible gardening, with multiple, raised vegetable beds situated behind a colorful flower garden. A harvest table in the middle of it all is often used for intimate garden-to-table meals with family and friends. Walk through the side gate into an old-fashioned backyard and a canopy of shade from a stately 40-year-old silver maple tree. Find grapes for jelly, vines for butterflies, and California native plants combined with a variety of colorful annuals and perennials. Sit a spell and enjoy the shade before you travel to the next garden on the tour.




20. - Marilyn & Jim Cavener

The Cavener's are blessed with a secluded location bordered by two channels of the Huntington Beach Wetlands Conservancy and only one neighbor. Since moving to this, their "dream come true," they have adopted a focus on creating a California-friendly xeriscape.

Marilyn hopes you will be delighted from the moment you arrive and experience the comfortable ambiance created by succulents (many started from cuttings from friends) and grasses, as well as other plants with nostalgic appeal. The pinyon pine (Charlie Brown's Christmas tree) is virtually unchanged from its first appearance as their oldest son's first Christmas tree (which was 45 years ago). Also visible is a rose, a gift from Marilyn's mother in 1984. The Cavener's feel you will appreciate the volcanic stone water feature, and hope you'll take a moment to enjoy the quiet of the pergola which was constructed using scrap lumber from their remodel several years ago.

Their side yard features an outdoor room with a fireplace--an extension of the home that provides a perfect place for relaxing conversation enhanced by the sounds of a water feature with aqua garden and the sight of stunning Staghorn fern. Then continue along one of many paths through the vegetable garden and see if you find their unique clay sewer pipe and wine bottle succulent garden! Beyond you will find the gazebo with an invitation to enter and enjoy the view of Huntington State Beach, the wetlands with its many birds and interesting environs, and Catalina Island.


This half-acre garden rises to the height of four stories. It has been terraced and filled with individual seating areas set into small retreats. The garden has several "microclimates", and Cathy has been creative in designing it over the past 22 years.

The bottom of the hill is overflowing with roses, annuals, and trees. This cottage style is set in a verdant, green, flat area that leads you on pathways and stairs to the beginning of a hill. As you ascend, sages take over, along with small trees. There is a small meadow with stone sheep, several arbors and vintage railings scattered throughout the area.




A "glass garden" fills a small area that never gets enough water; over 500 wine bottles are used for edging another area. The hill is home to many birdhouses and birdbaths ensuring lots of feathered visitors.

The top of the hill is a perfect place for a succulent garden, and it has grown like crazy. Red hot Firesticks muscle up to agaves and Matilija Poppies. Blooming yellow Palo Verde Trees share the top of the hill with Olive trees. This part of the garden is bursting with amazing colors that rival the roses at the bottom of the hill. This garden is full of surprises and color, scents, and beauty!

The entire garden is a little over half an acre, not including the residence and has been divided into several garden areas beginning with a potager garden in front of the house with hedges of thyme, rosemary, and lavender. The back gardens include the main garden which features rose arbors, a pergola and a willow tree and has been the site of over twenty weddings of friends and family. There is an arched rock bridge overlooking a small water garden and a pathway through the back yard leading to a cottage garden featuring a playhouse. Across from the playhouse is a wrought iron gate leading to a secret garden with a fountain. There is a sensory garden featuring a trampoline and magnetic beach sand. The rock swimming pool stairs branch off to a pathway across the back slope, and a woodland garden. A bench on the slope overlooks a cutting garden which features an arbor covered with morning glory over a planted birdbath. There is a small fairy garden under the willow tree which is often missed on a walk through. There are many butterfly host plants and nesting bluebird houses.



Welcome to this water-wise succulent and cacti garden. After many years of growing plants that required constant feeding, amending, watering and extensive labor, it decided to work with Mother Nature and grow only what flourishes in this environment without assistance. That did not mean giving up color, flowers or texture. Not only does the new garden have more year-round color than the original perennial garden, but Kay was pleasantly surprised to find that most succulents and cacti flower. As you

wander along flagstone pathways you'll see large waves of the same color planted next to waves of contrasting colors to create a mosaic pattern. Everything has been densely planted to eliminate the need for mulch, reduce weeds and further reduce water requirements. Enjoy the spectacular 180-degree views of Orange County provided by the hilltop setting. On a good day you can see Catalina Island! Another advantage of succulents is that they propagate very easily. As a result, she has only purchased 25-30% of plant material and propagated the remainder. The small front yard has been recently removed and is being replanted with cuttings from existing plants. Another bonus is that Kay no longer has a lawn, so she only needs a gardener every three months to hedge the shrubs.

When Scott and Margie bought their home in 2002, the backyard was a large patch of grass. Margie became passionate about gardening (after attending a few garden tours!), and decided she wanted to create her own sanctuary.

In 2010, they had all the lawn removed, and the soil sifted. With a blank canvas before her, Margie started to create. Not knowing what the next section would become, she worked on one vignette at a time. She gave herself one year to complete her garden, but quickly learned a garden is never really complete and always changing! Margie's Garden is filled with surprises in every corner. You will find repurposed items - rustic, vintage, and antique. Step stone pathways lead to different garden rooms, including a room with colorful flowers and vine-covered arbors; another with a birdbath, bird houses, and water fountains; and even a white-picket-fenced room.

There are no rules in the garden! You will be greeted by birds and butterflies! Scott says he is the "hired help." He explains, "I only prune and dig what and when she tells me." Margie's and Scott's greatest joy is sharing their garden with others and they are excited to welcome all of you!

This "Little House Under the Rainbow!" was a blank canvas with wall to wall grass, both front and back. Its saving grace was a 49 year-old Chinese Elm tree and a large sycamore tree. This was to be a place for adults and children alike, a place for grandchildren to experience gardening, wildlife, and fun with Grandma! Seven special garden areas were designed for the grandchildren's gardens. With help from a wonderful volunteer from the Southern California Bluebird Society, Anne learned the best place to put her bluebird house and began her quest to attract and provide for the Western Bluebird. Within a year, they began nesting and raising their young. Each year since, they've been a special blessing!

Today's garden is eclectic with garden art, rusty accents, and shades of a shabby chic past; and she'd love to share it with you!



During the severe drought in 2015, this homeowner took the water restrictions seriously and turned off the sprinklers. The result? -- A half-acre lot of brown grass. The time to re-landscape with drought-tolerant plants had come. With a Cape Cod style home, the owners wanted to avoid a water-wise, "desert scape".

After removing over 6,000 square feet of grass, the yard was replanted with mass plantings of drought-tolerant grasses, Iceberg and groundcover roses, Mexican sage, and other flowering shrubs. Mature trees, two established rose gardens, and a much smaller lawn were retained. Raised beds for vegetables and herbs provide an endless supply of summer produce. Flagstone and decomposed granite pathways complete this cottage garden design.

Today, this attractive garden is a mini-sanctuary for birds and butterflies, home to a flock of chickens, and the perfect spot to sip a glass of iced tea.


